Drive to promote women's empowerment

A LOCAL group dedicated to helping victims of abuse is hoping to raise BD10,000 in support of women's empowent activities.

The Women's Crisis Care In-ternational (WCCI) is hosting a fundraiser in the form of a mus-querade ball on Thursday at La Footaine Centre of Contempo-

rary Art. Tickets are still available to the event, which will be held under the theme 'Celebrate the Colours of Empowerment' and aims to apport the group's activities for

WCCI founder Mary-Justine Todd said all proceeds from the event will go towards supporting women's empowerment programmes at WCCI, which mainly include an advocacy programme in which over 120 trained women support victims of domestic or sexual violence through two helplines – in Arabic

"We have two 24/7 hotlines in Arabic and English, which are manned by first responders or advocates who are trained free of charge," she told the GDN.
"WCCI requires all volunteers to complete a 40-hour training before stating as a volunteer or."

"WCCI provides personal sup port for women who have been subjected to domestic or sexual violence as well as medium and long-term casework support for ms of abuse.

"We also provide community education and outreach to sup-port women's empowerment

WCCI also offers legal sup-port to women who do not have the means to hire a lawyer for di-vorce proceedings, immigration issues, and/or other issues related

to their abuse.
It also provides transport to the also provides transport to clients who do not have cars, or money for transportation to hos-pitals, police stations or courts. "We often help women who have gone through divorces or

have lost access to family money, and they have no means of feed-ing their children," explained Ms

"Occasionally, a woman needs safe refuge but has no family to stay with and because she is scared to file a police report against her abuser, she will not

against her abusec, she with not be able to stay in a shelter. "In these cases, WCCI will pay for several nights in a secure hotel location until she can figure out another plan of action. "Sometimes the children of

victims do not speak Arabic and thus can't enter public schools-in these cases, WCCI pays for the school fees until alternative arrangements can be made."

Ms Todd said the theme of

Thursday's ball was empowering women, both victims of violence and the wider community.

"We hope to inspire and en-courage women into the purpose of our programmes which is not

or our programmes which is not just supporting the victims of abuse, but also to encourage them and in turn empower," she added, "Most of the evening's pro-grammes are unique and guests are invited to come and celebrate with WCCC processing. with WCCI, wearing colourful and elaborate masks that reflect their own creativity, colour and empowerment to support women and families."
