

Demonstrations surge in Lebanon's capital over worsening economic crisis

Protesters blamed Lebanese political leaders for the widespread mismanagement and corruption.

undreds of Lebanese protested yesterday in the country's capital and other areas over an economic crisis that worsened over the past two weeks, with worries over dollar-reliant Lebanon's local currency losing value for the first time in more than two decades.

Lebanon is facing a deep-run-ning fiscal crisis as it staggers under one of the highest debt ratios in the world, at \$86 bil-lion or more than 150 per cent of the country's gross domestic product.

Many of Sunday's protesters in downtown Beirut blamed Lebanese political leaders for the widespread mismanagement and corruption.

Woman MP rapped for appearing on social media in 'home clothes'

Public Prosecution urged to revoke MP's parliamentary immunity

A Bahraini lawyer yesterday announced that she has filed a lawsuit against a female MP for appearing in videos on social media in "home

clothes" and in an "inappropriate" manner that doesn't fit a parliamentarian, Tribune has learnt.

The lawyer demanded the Public Prosecution to revoke the MP's parliamentary immunity and to take the necessary legal procedures against her.

This came as lawyer Fatima Al Hawaj announced in a post she shared on Twitter yesterday that she had filed a complaint against the MP, accusing the latter of causing inconvenience to others by misusing telecommunication networks, a crime that is punishable by imprisonment as per the provisions of Article 290 of the Kingdom's Penal Code

The papers mentioned that the MP shared footage of herself speaking about the benefits of narcotic substances, stating that she, the MP, "appeared as if she was inciting the society to use it".

The lawyer also mentioned in her complaint that the MP appeared in "home clothes" and in an "inappropriate" manner for a parliamentarian.

Ms Al Hawaj said that the complaint comes as "the Mp's actions are not appropriate for the Bahraini parliament and the Bahraini people, who chose her to represent them and defend their rights".

The lawyer added that the MP posted contents on Instagram and Snapchat which "degrades and affects the dignity of the people of Bahrain", in addition to "speaking about people with disabilities in an inappropriate manner that carried mockery of their suffering".

The MP is known for her activities on social media networks even before she was elected last year.

She usually posts highlights of her social activities on Instagram and Snapchat and uses these channels to directly engage with her followers, who are more than 25 000 on Instagram alone

than 25,000 on Instagram alone. The MP didn't comment on Ms Al Hawaj's complaint.

A'ali fake bombers sentenced

The High Criminal Court has sentenced two men to three years behind bars each for planting a fake bomb in Mali village.

Court files said that the defendant along with another one - fugitive in Iran - placed an object that looks similar to an explosive device in A'ali, with an aim of spreading fear and terror among citizens and residents.

It was initially thought that the bomb was real but explosive experts were called to come and examine it. And they declared it was a fake bomb.

Investigations found the two defendants were implicated in the incident after their fingerprints were extracted from the scene.

One of the two was arrested and admitted to their involvement in the case, but his co-suspect is still at large and was held guilty in absentia

"We placed it on June 12, 2016, with the intention to trigger panic in the area," the arrested man told prosecutors

The periodic meetings are aimed at unifying ICT standards throughout the government's various entities and supporting national initiatives.

During the meeting, the Committee reviewed Ministerial Committee decisions and other relevant initiatives, and discussed the progress of various projects including decisions adopted during previous meetings

Discussed were a number of strategic government ICT projects totalling more than BD 9 million in budget.

The most important of these included iGA's national appointment booking system for government service centres, the Ministry of Finance's budget e-system project, improvements to the Tender Board's eTendering System, and other projects the Committee is looking to implement at the lowest possible cost in accordance with the policies, standards and best practices of the Kingdom of Bahrain's ICT sector.

The Committee also discussed the implementation of decisions taken by the Ministerial Committee for Financial and Economic Affairs and Fiscal Balance, including initiatives to improve government efficiency and optimise operating expenditure.

Major General Abdelaziz al-Fagham's death triggered an outpouring of emotion on *Twitter*, with some condemning the killing of the Saudi ruler's "guardian angel".

Fagham, who was frequently seen by the king's side, died Saturday evening in the western city of Jeddah, police in Mecca said in a statement carried by the official Saudi Press Agency (SPA). A spokesman said that the gunman was shot dead by security forces, but that five officers were wounded in the melee that has shocked the kingdom, where

without giving further details. It added that Fagham died in hospital from his injuries and that an investigation into the

shooting had been launched. The bodyguard, with his tall, slender bearing, was well known among Saudis and often pictured attending closely to the

He also guarded the late King Abdullah, taking after his father who served under the former ruler for three decades.

The Okaz newspaper said the public took a liking to Fagham from the days when he guarded King Abdullah.

With this, he gained the leadership's trust and the love of the

Saudis," the paper said.
"News of the killing has come as a thunderbolt for Saudis, who were deeply saddened by his death," it said.

Okaz described him as "the most famous of all the royal guards" and said he was known for his vigilance and tact.

It said that he accompa-nied the king on all his travels, inside and outside of the kingdom.

Al-Faghm's family mourned his death in the early hours of Sunday, and Saudi Twitter was filled with reactions to the news of his death in Jeddah, making his name in Arabic the number one worldwide trend on the so-

cial media platform. "God bless my uncle, General Abdulaziz Baddah al-Faghm, after he was killed in his friend's house by a third friend (treacherously)," Baddah al-Faghm tweeted.

"May you rest in peace, hero ... I have seen nothing but good and loyalty from you for ten years ... I can't comprehend that I won't be seeing you anymore," Chairman of the General Entertainment Authority Turki al-Alsheikh tweeted.

Rains kill another 42 people in India

Monsoon rains continue to batter parts of India, with at least 42 more people dying in the past 24 hours, officials said yester-

At least 35 people died from rain-related causes in the northern state of Uttar Pradesh and seven died in the eastern state of Bihar, officials said.

The latest toll came days after reports of at least 59 fatalities in the past week amid forecasts that heavy rains would continue until Monday.

Sandhaya Kureel, spokeswoman for the Disaster Management and Relief Department in Uttar Pradesh, said Sunday that 17 people in the state were injured and being treated in hospitals. At least 29 houses collapsed because of heavy rain, she said.

Intense clashes ahead of China's anniversary

ierce clashes broke out between protesters and riot police in Hong Kong vesterday as thousands marched through the strife-torn city, during a day of global protests aimed at casting a shadow over communist China's upcoming 70th birthday.

Beijing is preparing for huge, tightly-choreographed festivi-ties from Tuesday to mark the founding of the People's Repub-lic of China, including a huge military parade that will revel in the country's emergence as a global superpower.

But ongoing unrest in Hong Kong threatens to upstage those celebrations as the semi-autonomous city boils with public anger over the erosion of its special freedoms under Beijing's rule. Democracy activists in the fi-

nancial hub had vowed to ramp up their nearly four-month-long campaign ahead of Tuesday's National Day celebrations, which Hong Kong protesters have dubbed a "Day of Grief". Yesterday witnessed the most

intense clashes in weeks as po-lice used tear gas, rubber bullets and water cannons at multiple locations during running battles with hardcore protesters hurling rocks and petrol bombs.

Using online forums and social media, protesters had called for "anti-totalitarian" rallies to be held around the globe. Marches were held in Australia and Taiwan, with more planned in some 40 locations across Europe and North America later in the day.

Clashes broke out before Hong Kong's unsanctioned march had begun after angry crowds in the shopping district of Causeway Bay surrounded and heckled officers who were conducting stop and searches.

But the tear gas fired by police only emboldened the crowds who then began walking through the streets in their thousands.

dozen homes a mile away.
"I think the actual danger to the Boca Chica village is low but it's not tiny," Musk said during a question and answer session. "So probably over time it'd be better to buy out the villages, and we've

made an offer to that effect." Some residents have rejected SpaceX's non-negotiable offer to buyout their homes for three times the market value.

A three-legged prototype of the rocket named Starhopper has test launched in the village twice since July, most recently flying as high as 500 feet (152 meters) and landing on an adjacent slab of concrete to trial Musk's next generation rocket engine dubbed Raptor.

Jacques Chirac: a flawed giant of

Combative and charismatic, the politician who died last Thursday was a statesn

hen France re-elected Jacques Chirac as president in 2002, left and centrist voters joked that they had to wear nose pegs as their sole motivation was to keep the far-right rabble-rouser Jean-Marie Le Pen out of the Elysee Palace.

With or without the pegs, the tactical voting by Chirac-loathing voters worked a treat. Chirac, representing the mainstream right, was handed a second term with a whopping 82 per cent share of the poll.

When the former president died on Thursday, aged 86, Mr Le Pen was gracious enough to say "even enemies deserve respect in death".

But the notion that Chirac owed success to a lesser-of-twoevils choice, with voters reluctantly favouring a conventional right-winger to block a sinister populist with repugnant views, overlooks a quirk of French pol-

Many conservatives in France and Chirac was one of them –
 would have slotted comfortably into what was then Tony Blair's "new Labour" UK government, a far cry from the more radical outlook of a party now led by Jeremy Corbyn.

mainstream centre-right under Chirac would have been reduced to the marginal status it has now under current president Emma-

nuel Macron. Chirac was a statesman of many contradictions. As a student, he briefly courted the far left, selling the Communist Party newspaper

L'Humanite on the streets of Paris. As he drifted to the right and rose in political life, he proved himself to be passionate about France, with a steely resolve to promote the nation's best interests. Notably, he opposed the US-led invasion of Iraq in 2003, a stance that brought him intense US and British criticism at the time.

He was also a man of considerable personal charm. His speeches and televised addresses were models of clarity and warmth, a valuable learning tool for foreigners like myself settling in France and trying to grasp the language of Moliere. With the charisma came substance, a level of statesmanship more accomplished heads of state

But there was also more than a hint of mischief in his approach to both his political and personal life. The man who enthusiastically collected artefacts from eastern

It is improbable that the French and African cultures and loved Japanese sumo wrestling was not above resorting to irregular and even criminal means.

When he made way for Nicolas Sarkozy in 2007, after 12 years in office, he found himself stripped of the constitutional immunity that had protected him from investigation. His name had cropped up in several cases of alleged misuse of public funds but he was able to argue that testifying was incompatible with his presidential

Finally, the past caught up with him. Four years after leaving office, he was tried in the notorious affair of fictitious city hall jobs created for cronies when he was mayor of Paris.

French justice is becoming less indulgent when dealing with corrupt politicians. But Chirac's failing health, as well as his record of public service, saved him from jail; he received a two-year suspended

Far from turning their backs on a disgraced ex-president, the French public rallied in support, polls showing a far greater ap-proval rating than when he was in office.



Shortly before his assassina-tion in Beirut in 2005, Hariri told a colleague: "Jacques Chirac is my best friend." Chirac, then still president, together with his wife Bernadette, were among the first world leaders to fly to Beirut to comfort Hariri's widow Nazek.

Chirac regarded himself as a friend of the Middle East in general and made it a key aim to restore French influence in the region. He paid a number of visits to the UAE and met both the Founding Father, Sheikh Zayed, and UAE President Sheikh Khalifa.

He was also the first French president to acknowledge the role of the French state in the deportation and extermination of Jews during the Second World War.

On pressing domestic issues. Chirac was weak, unwilling - unlike Mr Macron today - to brave the turmoil of street protests and see through difficult reforms. History might not remember

him as a great president, but as a flawed giant of French politics.

As France prepares to hold a national day of mourning on Monday, one word springs over and again from the lips of friends and former colleagues: empathy.

Mr Macron, whose own poli-tics are closer to Chirac's than the socialist government he served before launching his centrist La Republique En Marche party, spoke for many compatriots when he said in his televised tribute: "We have lost a statesman whom we loved as much as he loved us.

Urgent need to stem desertification

esertification is proving to be a rising concern for many countries across the world. The problem is more pronounced for countries that have deserts as a significant part of their existent geography, as these countries are fighting a much more tougher battle to ensure that the deserts do not expand more and consume the precious fer-tile agricultural land and turn the same into dusty dunes of sand. Currently around two billion hectares of productive land have already degraded into deserts worldwide. Making the matters worse is the fact that every year around 12 million hectares fall to desertification.

The fight against growing threat of desertification is be-ing spear headed by The United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) founded in 1994. UNCCD is a Convention to combat desertification and mitigate the effects of drought through national action programs that incorporate long-term strategies supported by international cooperation

and partnership arrangements. Africa, for example, has been at the centre of UNCCD efforts since long and the positive impact of these untiring efforts is beginning to bear fruits as many parts of Africa have successfully been pulled back from the clutches of desertification. The battles might have been won but the war against de-sertification is not over yet consider-ing the fact that it is a mammoth task. The budget itself

is daunting. According to the UNCCD, the cost to combat desertification has been estimated at \$450 billion annually.

The UNCCD summit currently underway in New Delhi, India put the global spot light on the urgency to rein in and control desertification on a global scale. Inaugurating the weeklong summit on 9th September 2019, The Prime Minister of India Shri. Narendra Modi stressed the need for the nations of the world to come together and contribute to a global water action agenda that can support land degradation neutrality. Similar sentiment was voiced by the UN Deputy Secretary-General Ms. Amina Mohammed who reminded the participant na-tions that the one third of the timeframe for delivering Agenda 2030 had already passed, and the countries need to act with increased urgency and ambition to get rid of silos that stand in the way of multiple benefits that can be achieved through coordinated action on land, climate and biodiversity. Participant delegates also strongly agreed with Mr. Ralph Gonsalves, the Prime Minister of Saint Vincent

and the Grenadines, who said that there are no countries big or small when it comes to desertification and climate change, and the only way to tackle these problems is to act on them as one global family.

The UNCCD summit highlights a very pressing matter that holds a direct relevance for the Kingdom of Bahrain. Bahrain's principal environmental problems are scarcity of fresh water, desertification, and pollution from oil production. Already population growth and industrial develop-ment have reduced the amount of agricultural land and lowered the water table, leaving aquifers vulnerable to saline contamination. The development priority accorded to oil resources has accelerated Bahrain's prosperity and become a main driver of its

economic growth.

The economic growth however has not been without its cost with the agricultural lands becoming a collateral damage in this process. As a result, lands that might otherwise be productive for food grain genera-tion are now gradually claimed by the expansion of the desert. Pollution from oil production

was accelerated by the Persian Gulf War and the resulting damage to oil-producing facilities in the Gulf area, which threatened the purity of both coastal and ground water, damaging coast-lines, coral reefs, and marine veg etation through oil spills and other discharges

These conditions are worrisome for Bahrain as in the future only those countries will be able to put up a sturdy fight with

climate change whose ecological assets are robust.

Bahrain must develop a desertification reversal protocol that forms the basis and backbone for comprehensive national efforts directed towards halting desertification in its tracks. In fact given the commitment and dedication of the Government, this can be achieved in record time. The strength of Bahrain is its public administration prowess as was evident in a 2018 United Nations report which ranked Bahrain fifth in Asia and 26th internationally in e-government development efforts. According to the 2018 UN E-Government Survey, Bahrain maintained its ranking among countries scoring very high on the E-Government Development Index (EGDI). This ex-cellent e-governance capability will prove to be a priceless asset for Bahrain to combat desertification and implement strat-egies that can aim to restore, protect and manage fertile land on a massive scale across the Kingdom of Bahrain. Once done successfully. Bahrain will be a shining example for the entire world to emulate.

The IRGC has effectively shot itself in the foot by deciding to expand its escalation to oil facilities. And if it sustains this path and carries out new major attacks, it will only make matter worse

There are still those in Tehran who are invested in the Europeans' supposed ability to influence the US to reduce sanctions. Some in Tehran think brinkmanship could force Mr Trump to back down. But the opposite has happened so far. Iran has ended up increasing its isolation and apposition and appeared to its Russian and Chilogue.

nese partners, and its European friends, as a reckless state, espe-cially after it targeted oil facilities. Ultimately, Mr Trump is benefiting because he appears to be the one refusing to take military action as long as his maximum pressure policy is working.

Iran's leaders could benefit from the US self-restraint, which should not be confused for cow-ardice. Rather, it is a cunning policy that Tehran would be unwise to dismiss, because each escalation will invite further devastating sanctions and bring Europeans ever closer to the US.

Iran's leaders must admit to their people that all talk of preserving the nuclear deal is a fal-lacy. There is division between European powers about the mer-its of the deal and now, there is little choice but to negotiate a new agreement with Mr Trump that addresses the flaws in his predecessor Barack Obama's deal

Iran's leaders must tell their people frankly that all European efforts and initiatives are dead in the water, with no other options but to engage in new negotiations, which cannot realistically be held under Iran's preconditions of lift-ing sanctions first. If Iran really wants to avoid war and internal collapse, it has to reconsider its

This brings us back to the logic of the regime born in Tehran four decades ago. This regime engaged in regional, sectarian and religious wars and today is in dire need of reform. Iran is the only state in the world that wants the world to respect and accept its founding, funding and training of extraterritorial, irregular armies and proxies in sovereign countries such as Lebanon, Iraq, Yemen and Syria, believing this to be a legitimate right.

To succeed, any collective dip-lomatic effort seeking to avoid war and step out of the failed nuclear deal must include international and European confrontation of this terrible flaw in the regime's logic, and demand reform to uphold the sovereignty of states as per the UN charter. It is futile to continue turning a blind eye to this problem in the name of realpolitik and the present situation affords an opportunity to end devastating wars and impose

much-needed legitimate reform. The decision is in the hands of both the leaders and the people of Iran. The indications coming from the IRGC are not reassuring, perhaps because reform poses an existential risk to its raison d'etre. The fear remains that Tehran's leaders, especially the supreme leader and IRGC, think the only way to save their regime from having to reform is war.

Trump considers delisting Chinese firms from US markets: sources

President Donald Trump's administra-tion is considering delisting Chinese companies from US stock exchanges, three sources briefed on the matter said on Friday, in what would be a radical escalation of US-China trade ten-

The move would be part of a broader effort to limit US investment in Chinese companies, two of the sources said. One said it was motivated by the Trump administration's growing security concerns about the companies' activities.

Major US stock indexes slipped on the news, which came days before China celebrates the 70th anniversary of the birth of the People's Republic on Oct. 1, when the world's No. 2 economy will shut down for a week of festivities.

Shares of Hangzhou, Zhejiang-based Alibaba ended down 5.15 per cent. JD.com fell 5.95pc and Baidu Inc declined 3.67pc. The iShares China Large-Cap ETF shed 1.15pc. Shares of New York Stock

Exchange-owner Intercontinental Exchange Inc ended down 1.88pc and shares of Nasdaq Inc declined
